While Field Days are supplying better sporting facilities.


Original families have stayed trialing new crops,

We'll watch the new generation keep Dowerin alive.



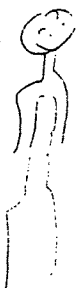

On Tuesday we walked around Rottnest doing activities and worksheets in our groups. That night we played games in the meal room.

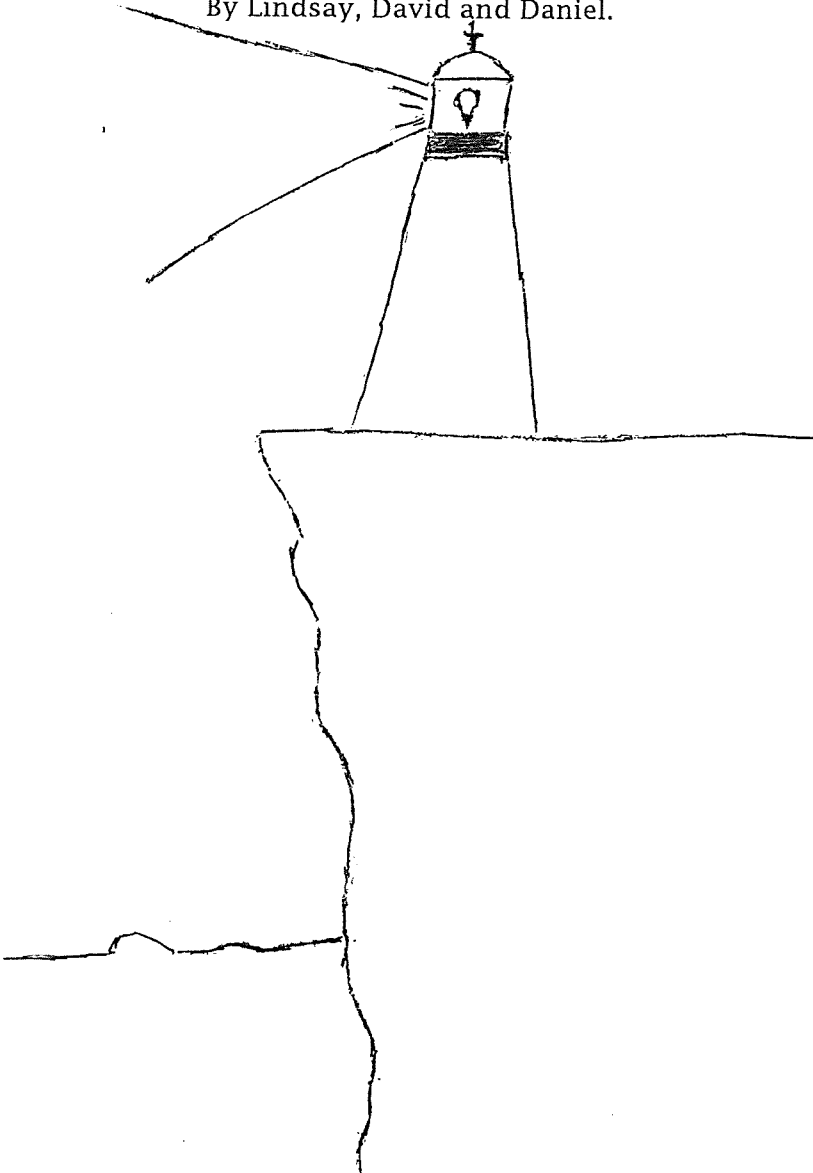

Thursday we all enjoyed, We watched the Magic of Flight in the Omni centre and afterwards went

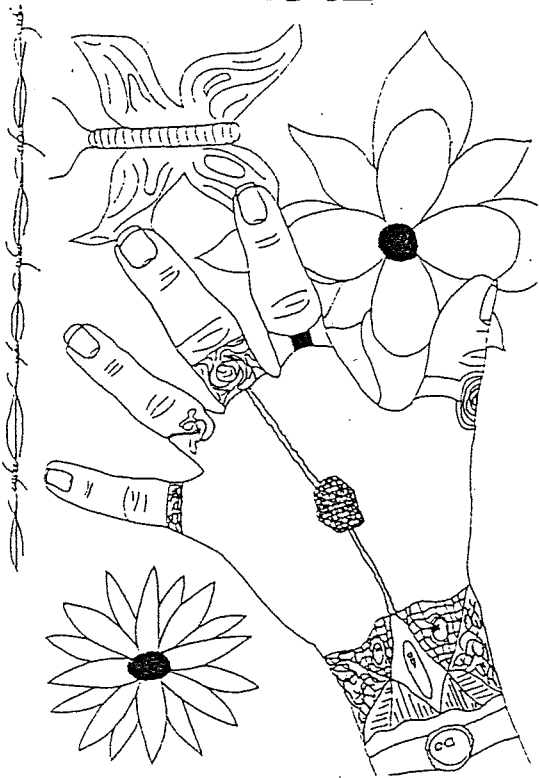

## SCIENCE FUN DAY

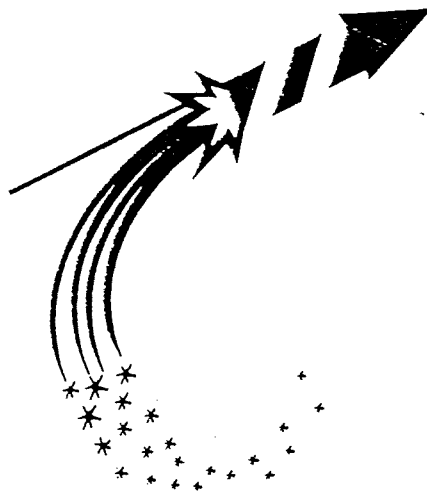

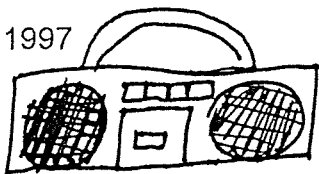
**JUKEBOX**
