Robots are on the way at Dowerin

T won't happen this year. But it won't be long before the main drawcard at Dowerin GWN7 Machinery Field Days will be an autonomous vehicle.

And while it's a stretch to suggest it will be WA-made, the town of Dowerin boasts a few budding school students already trialling their own robots.

Several Dowerin District High School Year Five and Year Six students have been involved in a program, involving the popular LEGO MINDSTORMS EV3 PRODUCT.

By combining LEGO elements with LEGOprogrammable motors and sensors, students can build and operate unique robots. Earlier this year, the school

held the first regional

RoboCup, involving three other regional schools all using EV3 robots.

The project-oriented educational initiative is designed to introduce RoboCup to primary and secondary school children, as well as undergraduates.

The focus at a junior level is on education with more complex levels aimed at fostering Artificial Intelligence (Al) and robotics research by providing a standard problem where a wide range of technologies can be

integrated and examined.
The realistic entry level is pre-primary where very basic coding can be taught as children build their working robots.

Another RoboCup will be held next year with the aim to

rotate the event throughout the Wheatbelt in future years to encourage participation in competitions at a State and national level.

Interestingly, the ultimate goal of international

organisers of RoboCup, is that by the middle of the 21st century, a team of fully autonomous humanoid robot soccer players will compete against the (human) World Cup champions.

MEN RISK ALL TO SAVE KIDS IN A CHURCH FIRE





On the long trip over, we read 'The Outsiders' by S.E. Hinton



The Outsiders tells the story of the greasers and Socs, two loosely-organised teen gangs in mid-1960s Tulsa, Oklahoma. The greasers are "from the wrong side of the tracks," while the Socs are privileged kids from wealthy families. The narrator and protagonist, Ponyboy Curtis, becomes involved in the killing of a Soc when he and his friend, Johnny Cade, are attacked in the park one night. The two greaser boys go on the run, hiding out in an abandoned church in Windrixville. One morning, Dally, a member of the gang, comes to collect them. Whilst they are out having breakfast, the church catches fire due to their cigarette butts not being fully extinguished. Ponyboy, Dally and Johnny jump into the burning church when they realised that a group of children have ventured inside. Unfortunately for the greasers, this results in severe injury and eventually the death of Johnny.

We left some words of advice to our friends, in the form of a poem. The poem *Nothing Gold Can Stay by Robert Frost* explains that nothing, especially that which is perfect and beautiful, can last forever. He gives several examples of this:

- The first green of spring is her hardest hue to hold
- So Eden sank to grief
- and So dawn goes down to day

These are all different ways of saying the same thing: nothing good can last. Frost uses nature as the main symbol for his theme because the cycle of life and death shown through the four seasons provides imagery that many people can identify with; and in this poem, nature symbolises the idea that all the good and beautiful things in life will eventually fade away. One of the most important messages to take from this poem is that once you recognise how precious certain moments are, you will appreciate them even more.

On the surface, it seems that the theme of this poem is a sad one, however, Frost uses

nature's first green if gold
her hordest hue to hold
her early leaf's a flower
but only to an hour
then leaf subsides to leaf
for Eden sank to grief
to dawn golf down to day

Science

This year the high school learnt about Physical Sciences, Chemical Sciences, Biological Sciences and Earth and Space Sciences. We also welcomed two Pre-Service Teachers from the University of Western Australia into the classroom throughout the year, Miss Annabel Tolios and Miss Samantha Allsopp.

One of the highlights for the Year 7 & 8 students this year was attending the Wheatbelt Science Forum. Here we learnt about coding games for tablets, how to use Google Earth to identify different locations and landscapes. Finally we learnt about gravitation waves. Part of this was looking at how they can detect the waves. To simulate this we had to shoot Nerf guns at each other to try to create an outline of an image, like how they look at the location of sources of radio waves to create an image.

The Year 7 & 8's also particularly enjoyed Biological Sciences when they got to dissect sheep hearts and lungs as a part of their study of anatomy. Whilst a few had been tentative about it in the days leading up to the experiment, on the day everyone got involved and had a go at dissecting the hearts to look at the internal structures of the hearts valves, atriums and ventricles. This was the first time no students had to go outside for fresh air because they were squeamish or light headed, so the class should be very proud of themselves.













Year 9 and 10

A highlight for the class this year was studying ecosystems and how abiotic factors, such as rainfall, fire and drought affects plants and animals. As a part of this the students designed an experiment where they had to explore how fire affects seed germination. This involved constructing a device where they could safely heat the seeds and collect ash. They the planted their seeds in a mixture of potting mix and ash (and set up a control experiment of straight potting mix and non heated seeds) and waited to see if they would germinate. Not all were successful, but the broad beans grew like lightning.

Another highlight was a Physics project where we had to put our engineering skill to good use and design and construct a pulley system that could successfully transport tomatoes down a mountain range in Nepal. Dylan Metcalf's design was highly successful, his was able to transport 20 Cherry Tomatoes down our simulated mountain with no damage.

HASS 2017

The Black Death

The 7/8's began the year with the Black Death—one of the most devastating pandemics in human history. It resulted in the deaths of up to 200 million people peaking in the mid 1300's. It originated in Asia where it travelled along the Silk road. Spread by rats and fleas, it killed 30-60 % of Europe's population.





NAZI GERMANY

The 9/10's spent Term 1 studying Nazi Germany—the period from 1933-1945 when Germany was governed by a dictatorship under the control of Adolf Hitler. Starting World War 2 when he invaded Poland in 1939, he remained in power until the allied powers defeated him in 1945. He and his Nazi Party were responsible for the deaths of 6 million Jews known as the Holocaust.

Parliament House and the Constitution Centre

Term 3 ended with a visit to the Constitution Centre where we split up in to groups to learn about the history of our Constitution created in 1901 after Federation as well as the role of the High Court in hearing appeals from the Federal, State and Territory courts. We finished off the day with lunch at Parliament House, a meet and greet with the Hon. Mia Davies and a tour that ended up with us sitting in on 'Question Time' - what an experience! The politicians were not on their best behaviour!



The 7/8 class had the exciting task of being entre-SHARK TANK preneurs for the term - taking part in a Shark Tank activity, inventing a product and presenting it to the 'Sharks' for possible investment.



Filthy Rich and Homeless



Term 4 focussed on the themes of Liveability and Well being. Students were able to gain a bit of an insight into being homeless by viewing the SBS documentary 'Filthy Rich and Homeless'. Did you know that in Australia, one in every 200 people is homeless; that is without safe, secure or affordable housing. Liveability was also discussed with a focus on the Wheat belt region and all it had to offer. We found out that our region caters the best for families with young children 0-4 and the over 65 age group. Sadly, teenagers and young people aged 15-29 are moving out fast.



Food & Textile, Technology

Year 7/8 class planned and prepared Spaghetti Cheese Subs for the whole school.



Year 9/10 students focused on Food from around the World. Myles Smith prepared delicious Thai Green Chicken Curry. While Jarvis Way prepared the complicated Korean dish, Bibimbap









In Textiles, students constructed a patchwork potholder, using accuracy of cutting and sewing to line up all seams. They also challenged themselves by learning to add a bias binding to the edge to finish their project to a high standard. Pattern making was next and a pair of bed shorts for the summer months was the design brief. Students were amazed how quickly the shorts came together once they had an understanding of the steps of joining fabric together to create a seam.







DFES CADETS

In 2017 our cadets unit continued to grow and expand our knowledge, leadership and community involvement. This year, our cadets developed their knowledge and skills of roping, first aid, fire awareness, radio communication and teamwork. During Semester One, our cadets focused on radio communication and roping. These skills were then put to the test on our first combined camp with the Wyalkatchem's cadets group. We also gained a grant from lottery west to purchase a new trailer for the unit, which we received just in time for the camp to Walyunga National Park. Over three days, the Dowerin cadets demonstrated excellent leadership and communication skills during some challenging situations. At the conclusion of the camp, many new friendships were made and most cadets were asking when the next combined camp would be.

Semester Two started with first aid. After three weeks of practise and learning, the students attended the St John's Ambulance sub centre were their knowledge and ability to act in an emergency was tested. Thank you to Mrs Denise Sutherland and Mrs Carla Proud for their time and expertise. The remainder of Term 3 was spent learning about being prepared for a fire. Cadets were tasked with developing a presentation to present to the Pre-primary to Year 6 classes. The presentation needed to inform each class about what was important to remember in the case of a fire emergency.

Term 4 started with our cadets unit undertaking our first community project. Our task was to make the bird hide walk trail bushfire ready.

To finish off the year, we had another combined camp with the Wyalkatchem DFES cadets in Geraldton. The camp was part reward for another fantastic year and part educational, with visits to HMAS Sydney memorial, Crayfish Factory and Geraldton Museum.
